

Fruits of our labors: Chinese potato .. Chontaduro berries....Tagua nuts .. The cocoa beans are growing School of Arts and Crafts

Getting to Corregimiento 8, a small hamlet near Buenaventura, in the Department of Valle del Cauca means crossing a landscape of abundance. Different shades of green abound, a bunch of chontaduro berries provide a splash of yellow, orange and red reminding us that we are close to the Pacific.

A canoe takes you closer to the river, you smell the current and suddenly, without realizing it, you are surrounded by smiling people full of hope. And it is here, far from the beaten track, where we find the real spirit of a community bound together by their essence, the tones of their skin, their enthusiastic grasping of opportunities, their readiness to work for the future in spite of the conditions of violence that seem to plague the present. We see the smiling eyes, we perceive their strength, their dreams, these are the people.

Other voices

As the country has been developing over the years, a gap has opened up between the rich and the poor and this is so much more apparent in the countryside since it is so far away from the urban centers that the Government cannot satisfy the basic needs of the communities living in these parts of the world. Since the distances are so great, access to consumer goods is so much more expensive. This is further compounded by average wages being far below those of urban areas along with the absence of basic social or employment benefits given the amount of informal employment prevailing, so poverty is so much more acute in the rural areas.

... the private sector has a great opportunity to demonstrate to the country at large by investing comprehensively in Colombia's countryside (rural entrepreneurship, job creation, access to production means, social, technical, business and commercial assistance, innovation, sustainable technological development, added-value, infrastructure, housing, education, healthcare, basic sanitation, environmental protection over river basins etc) have a huge social and economic impact.

The first thing you see in the morning is the mist, so the first reaction is to get dressed and grab a hot drink. Once on the road and meeting other passers-by, we come into contact with the human kindness and warmth of this region.

2.400 meters above sea level in Sabaneta, a little hamlet next to the town of Granada, Cundinamarca, a group of farmers get together to see how they can improve their crops and strengthen their community association. The sun getting hot. There are community leaders of all ages, men and women with an enormous capacity for team-building, prepared to learn and work towards greater social and agricultural development.

As we head back we see the creole potato plants. Some are just emerging, others are fully grown, but all impeccably planted and cared for in readiness of a bumper harvest.

"Companies must invest in rural development projects because it is in the rural areas where the greatest problems lie. 62,1% of the rural population in Colombia are poor, 21,5% are destitute or live below the poverty line. Social and public services are in short supply here and their quality is poor. Infrastructure lags far behind, economic and social indicators leave a lot to be desired compared with those found in the urban areas; violence and conflict are more pronounced in the rural areas, yet environmental protection, natural resources and biodiversity mainly depend on these neglected areas.

The country's rural areas have an enormous development potential given the abundance of fertile land, water resources and a whole mega diversity, etc. - but the lack of care and attention and the discrimination compared to other parts of the country have meant that we have completely ignored this potential and so we see a far greater concentration of poverty, marginalization and violence in the countryside than we do in the urban areas. If Colombia does not rectify this imbalance it shall never be able to achieve a comprehensive social and economic development in which its companies and businesses may thrive."

Who can embrace the river?

Fruits of our labors:

Naidí · A thousand pesos · Hearts of palm · Team work

In Vigía del Fuerte, a small town in the Antioquenian Urabá region, there are no cars, the rain signals the different seasons and many of the promises made in times gone by have yet to be

The Atrato river forms a part of the history of the many communities that inhabit this region, as it winds its way slowly through the abundant vegetation, flanked by the vibrant palm trees along its banks. Today these palm trees have provided transformation, knowledge, work, food safety, opportunities for today as well as the future.

What began as a school lunch hall soon became a meeting place for the local community so they could interact and learn. A multi-colored school that stands out amid a landscape dominated by greens and browns. Now they have set up a company with local partners with a view to distributing their produce on a nationwide basis.

Palm trees that have gone unnoticed for years are providing a new lease on

.. the fruits of the murrapo palms and jaqua trees and the oil of the thousand peso tree have slowly become a real and sustainable source of income generation as well as an important contribution for the region's development. An entire range of produce is being cultivated thanks to the region's fertile biodiversity without there being any precedent or tradition with regard to their use or application and this is now beginning to drive the local economy.

However, this is not just limited to the work with the beneficiary communities, since we went a step further with the Suramericana Foundation deciding to invest in the Productos de Bosque Naidí SAS, a company in charge of liaisoning between the producer communities and the market with a view to securing a larger-scale distribution of fruit pulp and hearts of palm. Using a value-added production chain approach, this alliance has given rise to a promising business. This comes as a much welcome change since before this region had largely depended on unsustainable and destructive mining and timber activities.

Now we have set up 500 hectares of forestland to be handled by the communities, for which 37 families have received due certification from SENA, the Colombian Apprentice Institute. Permits have been obtained in order to set up a local production plant for jaqua pulp, In order to oversee the entire process, the company, Bosque Húmedo Biodiverso, has been set up along with a team of 17 pickers, for which technical training has already been given. Also we are supporting educational development in three communities with the building of schools and school dining halls.

Overall we have developed two supply chains for the products being harvested in this region, which represents new opportunities for the Medio Atrato region. This shall prevent any further mishandling of local forestry resources, while creating just the right conditions for the conservation and management of this important forestland.

El Salado

And suddenly you are in El Salado. Although it looks completely deserted soon the villagers begin to appear at their doors and windows, curious to see who has come to visit. These houses are now filled with new stories, the community has new projects to look forward to, there is a new lease on life, and we are now seeing the transformation of both the land and its people.

El Salado is a little village full of colors and textures that are impossible to forget, just as the memory of those who are no longer with us. Here in the sunlight we see the white and yellow butterflies dart out in front of us almost as a sign of welcome just as the tended land is welcoming dreams of a restored future.

Two years ago El Salado began a process of reconstruction. This sleepy hamlet, located in the Montes de Maria in the Department of Bolívar, saw one of the most atrocious massacres in the history of Colombia. In February 2000 almost 300 paramilitary soldiers surrounded the village, commanded the villagers to come out of their houses, killed 66 men and raped and maimed the womenfolk.

Today there are more than 60 public and private institutions who are working with the community on a one-year program aimed at improving education, infrastructure, healthcare, community development, culture and safety.

This has been made possible thanks to companies such as Sura who are intent on reconstructing the village with the firm understanding that their contributions are not merely donations but firm commitments to helping in every way they can. Reconstructing a village with an amputated soul is not an easy task nor can it be accomplished overnight. It is not just a case of donating resources, materials, cement and bricks to repair a crumbling church. This is far more difficult since we are trying to remedy and reconstruct something that cannot be seen, namely fear and mistrust, with the firm intention of restoring the villagers' faith in themselves. Only a comprehensive initiative that resolves the entire chain of problems and provides the required solutions with the enthusiasm of both private and public institutions, shall enable El Salado to lead a new stage of reconciliation in Colombia.

One of the most important lessons learned with this project is how well the private sector has worked in close conjunction with the Government institutions. By reconstructing El Salado, we are showing that true results are not achieved by those who are trying to bring down the Government but those who using their own skills and knowledge are able to work with the public sector in order to maximize the impact on the common good.

This cannot be accomplished by merely handing out booklets to schoolchildren, on the contrary, it requires an intersectorial effort to culturally transform imaginary practices and meanings that have historically led to infringements of these basic rights.



AN UNFORGETTABLE ENCOUNTER

He was so disappointed when he got to school to find that all his teachers and classmates had already left. He was mad at himself for arriving late, he should have realized how long it would take to walk there. But he had looked in his pockets and seen that he did not have any money to catch the two buses he needed to get there.

That day, Braulio had got up early, as he did every Saturday to go to school in the San Javier barrio where he attended reading, writing and basic maths classes together with other youngsters and adults who had not been able to finish their basic primary school education. However that Saturday, normal classes were canceled because the school had organized a day out to the Botanical Gardens to visit a Book Fair where the Argentinean writer Sergio Aguirre was scheduled to read aloud. Braulio had heard of this writer in his reading classes.

At just 15 and after a difficult life, Braulio had to abandon his studies because the violence present at the school was threatening his very existence. This is when he found out about the possibility of continuing his studies through the Alphabet literacy program aimed at youngsters and adults who belonged to the La Independencia educational community. It was an ideal opportunity for him.

So he set off walking, wondering what the writer, whose books had been read out in class, was like. He had even seen pictures of him. "Would it be possible for me to meet someone grand enough to write books?" he asked himself as he continued on his long walk. Somehow Braulio had got it into his head that all writers were dead. Wouldn't it be great if I could ask him something? he continued to explore the possibility. Braulio wanted to ask him the reason why he had not been able to visit his father all these years that he had been in prison. Shall I ever see the day that I could write as well? He asked himself. Braulio had always thought that he could write much more interesting stories based on his own experience. "It would be wonderful if I could" he mused, while trying to walk a little guicker.

Finally he arrived at the Botanical Gardens and saw that all his friends and teachers were getting on the bus to go back to the school. Nevertheless, Braulio stayed at the Book Fair and began to go around the book stalls and the auditoriums trying to find the writer he had heard so much about ... but sadly to no avail.

That same afternoon, Sergio Aguirre found out that there was a boy who was looking for him and that he had traveled a great distance on foot. So, with the sensitivity that characterizes a person who loves literature and great stories, he said to himself: - If the boy came all this way and could not find me, then,

I shall go and look for him. So that is how Sergio and Braulio finally met up.







Naidí S.A.

Amount invested: COP 1,000 million

Productos del Bosque Naidí produces frozen acai pulp for export specifically for the beverage, cosmetic and industrial markets in the US. Naidí's products have a great social impact since thanks to their business model they are able to employ more than 150 pickers from the Afro-Colombian communities on Colombia's Pacific Coast.

Fondo Cacao BYR

Amount invested: COP 2.500 million

This fund directly invests in the growing of cocoa bean crops, which take 10 years to properly mature. Besides the results obtained in terms of harvested production, this project creates jobs and serves as a means of substituting and preventing the planting of illicit crops.

Valor Forestal Caucho Natural Amount invested: COP 2,000 million

A Private-Equity Fund aimed at setting up and running rubber plantations, either directly or indirectly in the Colombian Orinoquía region. This Fund, led by stock brokers, is aiming to reach a total of 10,000 hectares of rubber crops, which shall have an important impact on the country's social and agroindustrial development.
